Dear Parents,

I hope this message finds you well in what are very trying circumstances. I appreciate fully the challenges that the school closing at such short notice places on you, and I want to take a moment today to speak with you directly.

No one could have envisaged the situation we find ourselves in, and it has demanded that we change the way we do things immediately, without notice. I would like to thank you, the parents, for all your support and understanding throughout the course of the last week. I would also like to wholeheartedly thank and applaud all the staff of the school, teaching and non-teaching, for their tremendous efforts in preparing learning packs and resources for all our children at such short notice.

On Friday 13<sup>th</sup> March, we celebrated our Patron Saint, St. Patrick, with a St. Patrick's Day concert in the school assembly hall as has been tradition at St. Joseph's Galbally for generations. From traditional dancing, singing, to the retelling of the story of St. Patrick, it was everything an assembly should be – a display of our wonderful children's talents, performed for the rest of the school community, in a spirit of support, respect, appreciation and faith. Our school ethos filled the assembly hall that day, with the sounds of laughter, clapping hands, singing voices and the occasional prompt of encouragement from a teacher!

Our school motto, as the children often hear me refrain, is '**Learning, Friendship, Respect**'. The challenge for us all now is to ensure that the children's **learning** continues. Yes, this will look somewhat different, and in between the running of a home, will have to be done in a realistic way. Finally, I ask everyone, out of **respect** to all the vulnerable and elderly in our community, to follow the guidance issued by the PHA. Galbally, more than anywhere, is bound together by a sense of community, togetherness, and collective strength. In this time at home with our families, may we all work together for the greater good of our community.


